漢字Kanji

About Kanji

Kanji (漢字) is one of the three scripts used in the Japanese language. Kanji script consists of Chinese characters, which were first introduced to Japan in the 5th century via Korea.

Until 5th Century the Japanese language itself had no written form. In the 5th century Japanese Buddhist monks brought the Chinese text written in the Chinese language i.e. in Kanji(ideograms) to Japan. Since then Japan adopted Kanji Script.

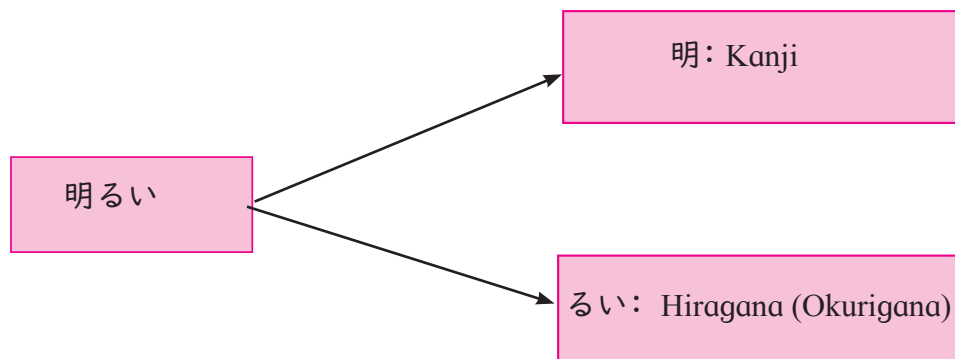
Kanjis are ideograms, i.e. each character has its own meaning and corresponds to a word. By combining kanji characters, more words are created and these words are called as “Jukugo”. For example, the combination of “electricity (電)” with “car (車)” means “電車—Densha” it means “train”.

Kanji Reading

When adopting the characters, the Japanese not only introduced the characters' original Chinese pronunciations, but also associated them with the corresponding, native Japanese words and their pronunciations/reading. As a result, most of the kanji characters have two readings, (On yomi- Chinese Reading. This is shown in Katakana) and (kun yomi-Japanese Reading. This is shown in Hiragana)

The Kun-reading (kun-yomi 訓読み) is the native Japanese reading associated with the meaning of a Kanji. Every kanji has 3D effect i.e. Meaning, On reading and Kun reading.

Kanjis are used for writing nouns, adjectives, adVerbs and Verbs. But unlike the Chinese language, Japanese language cannot be written entirely in kanji. For grammatical endings and words without corresponding kanji the Hiragana syllables are used they are called “Okurigana”. See the example below.



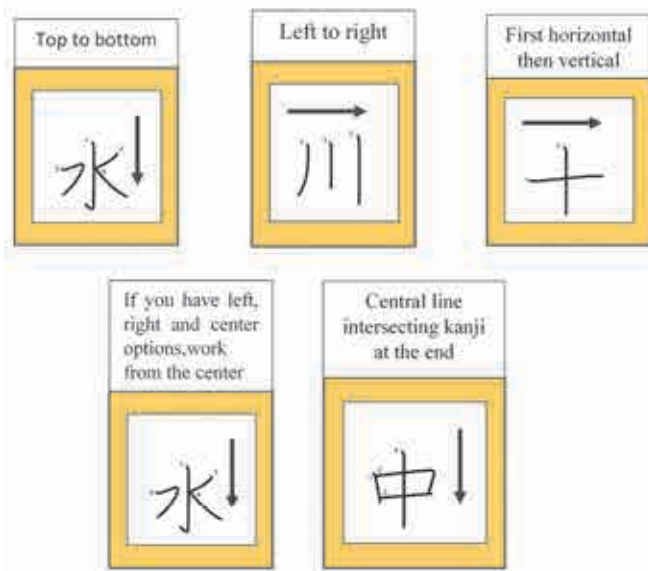
Number of Kanji Characters

There are approximately ten thousand of kanji characters, of which 2000 to 3000 are required to understand newspapers. A set of 2136 characters has been officially declared as the “kanji for everyday use required”.

Stroke Order

Each kanji character consists of stroke order (hitsu jun 筆順). The rules for stroke order were developed to facilitate writing and reading, and also to give a Kanji character a balanced and esthetical appearance.

As a general rule, Kanji characters are written from left to the right and from the top to the bottom. General rules to write kanji characters:

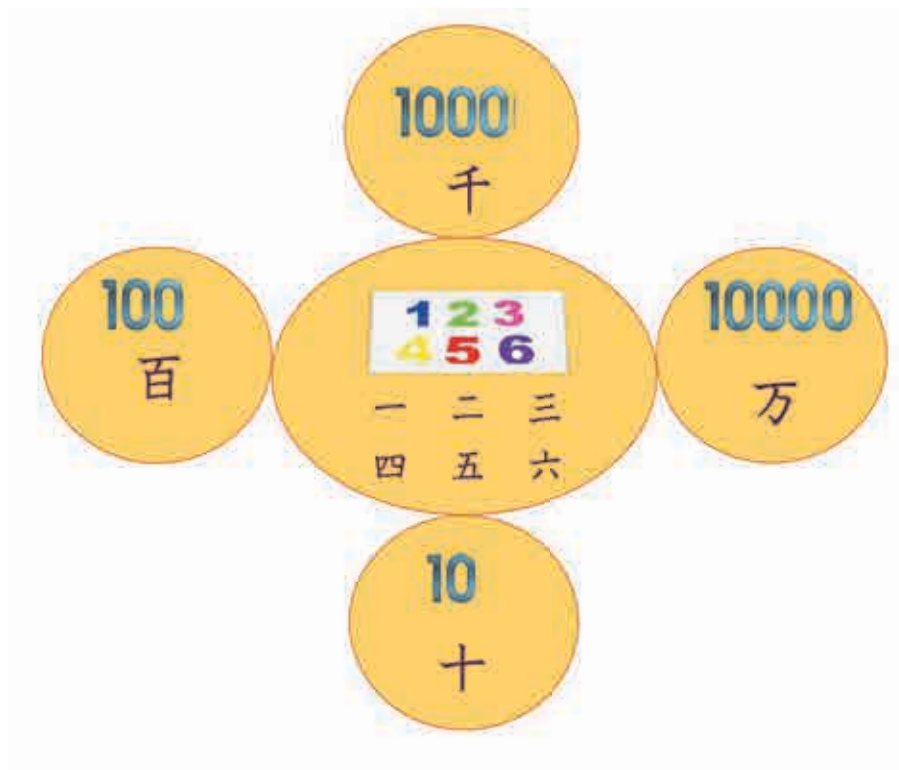


- Top to bottom
- Left to right
- First horizontal then vertical
- If you have left, right and center options, work from the center
- Central line intersecting kanji at the end

Let's begin and learn simple basic kanjis.
