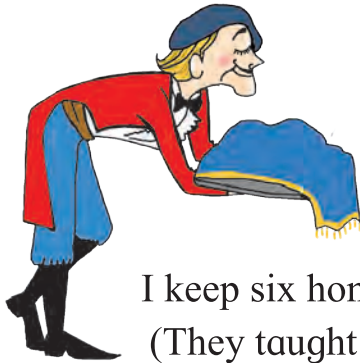


5. Six Honest Serving-Men



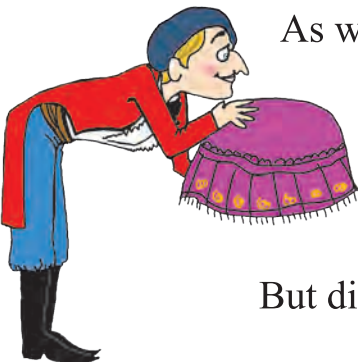
I keep six honest serving-men

And How and Where and Who.



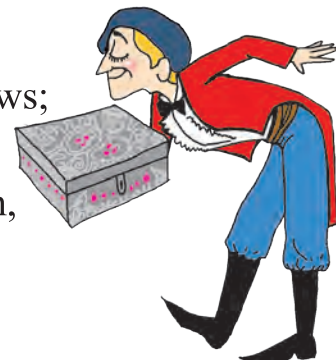
I send them over land and sea,
